

Britain and the League of Nations endorsed the reestablishment of a Jewish national home in the Palestine Mandate, drew the boundaries of this new territory, and committed to facilitating Jewish immigration there. By this time, Tel Aviv had already been built (1909), and Jews were the majority in Jerusalem.

Responding to Arab pressure, Britain cut off 77 percent of the Palestine Mandate and forbade Jewish immigration to what became Jordan. In 1923, Britain cut off and gave the Golan Heights to the French Mandate for Syria. The British also appointed the racist Haj Amin al-Husseini as the leader of the Arabs in Palestine.

During the 1948 war, Jordan invaded and annexed an area previously known as Judea and Samaria and renamed it the "West Bank." Meanwhile, Egypt occupied Gaza. Neither country ever tried to establish a Palestinian state in these areas.

In 1967, Israel fought a preemptive war against Arab armies that had surrounded its borders. Israel captured the Golan Heights, the Sinai Peninsula, Gaza, and the West Bank.

Israel gave up the entire Sinai Peninsula in the 1979 Israel-Egypt peace treaty, withdrew from its security zone in southern Lebanon in 2000, and removed all Israeli settlements from Gaza in 2005. Today, the permanent borders between Israel and the West Bank must still be negotiated by Israelis and Palestinians.
