I absolutely loved being a Madrich at summer camps.

My time working in youth movements is something I will cherish for a very long time. Perhaps the most memorable parts were pre-camp. Spending hours of every day for a week planning ideas, activities and events for camp are some of my best experiences of being an educator. You are challenged to come up with something new to engage young people in the values of your youth movement, and of course it's a lot of fun and a great time for people to develop friendships!

Israel is rated the 5th happiest country in the world! How is this possible?

Opening question: what are the first things you think of when you think of Israel?

Most common answers are: War, Religion, Falafel.

Each year, the World Happiness Report is released. Israel has on average been in the top 10, and came 4th in 2023 and 5th in 2024.

How can a country with supposedly so many problems have such a happy population?

Happiness report researches countries based on:

Q1: Israel has many issues like other countries, and some a bit more unique. What sort of problems do Israelis face? (examples: war, religion vs. state, political corruption, poverty, drought, conscription)

Q2: Think about any time you have visited Israel. Any friends or family you know. Why do you think Israelis are so high on the happiness scale?

(Tips for generating discussion: think back to the factors from the start of the session. Israel ranks particularly high on social support, generosity and satisfaction of GDP - the personal wealth of each person)

This calls back to the title of the activity. Israel has built a society, that despite its issues, has so much to be happy about, and therefore the average person is happy with what they have!


Democracy Above All!

This session explores the Israeli democratic system with fun activities.



What You Need:

- 1. A large bag of sweets e.g. Starburst
- 2. Participants to sit in a circle.
- 3. Pour all the sweets into the middle.



- On my signal, you may leave your chair to pick up as many sweets as possible.
- However, you may only pick one sweet at a time.
- You may steal sweets from another chair if the person has left it.
- You may not take more than one sweet at a time.
- You will have 90 seconds.
- The person with the most sweets wins.



TIME 90 SECONDS, AND THEN EVERYONE STOP! COUNT YOUR SWEETS! WHO HAS THE MOST?



What did you think of the game?

- Was it chaotic?
- Was it fair?
- Does it make sense that someone who only won I sweet can win as part of a team?

THIS GAME REPRESENTS WHAT ISRAELI ELECTIONS ARE LIKE. CHAOTIC, BUT SOMETIMES THAT'S DEMOCRACY. HOW DOES IT WORK IN ISRAEL? LET'S FIND OUT!







What is the Knesset?

- In Knesset elections, voters cast one ballot for an entire party. They don't vote for individual candidates.
- The entire country is a single electoral constituency. There are no districts divided up by area.
- Parties must get at least 3.25% of the popular vote to enter the Knesset. The number of seats they win is based on how many votes they receive.

Whilst in the UK we are used to having around 5 or 6 parties in government, Israel's current government has 13 elected parties, with 39 having stood for elections in 2022!




Why are there 120 seats in the Knesset?

There are 120 seats up for grabs. Votes are calculated as a percentage. In order to have a majority and make sure that you have control of the Knesset decisions, you need a majority.

Q: What is the minimum majority of 120? (61)

NO SINGLE PARTY HAS EVER GOT A MAJORITY IN ISRAEL!



Provide them with the graph, and a booklet of all the current parties with information about their views. Explain the basic differences between left and right wing politics in Israel e.g. taxes, peace with Palestinians, settlements, and religious views e.g. public transport on Shabbat.

Let the participants spend time placing each party on the spectrum as they see. Compare and discuss!





- Play Knesset Bingo!
- Instead of numbers, read out views!
- Match it to your Knesset bingo card!
- First to fill the card fully and shout "Knesset" wins!

<u>Recognising a Palestinian State</u>



Since October 7th, other countries have been recognising a Palestinian state. Don't Palestinians have the right to ask the UN to establish an independent Palestinian state?

A long term agreement between Israel and the Palestinians needs to be mutual, and not unilaterally forced by other countries. Israelis and Palestinians have the right to self-determination and self-governance. Israel has made many offers over the years, each more generous than the last, and none have been accepted by the Palestinian leadership. Other countries recognising a Palestinian state without proper negotiations between both sides is counterproductive. Such actions avoid making the tough compromises necessary for peace, which must include accepting Jewish rights to self-determination and recognising that Israel is the one and only homeland of the Jewish people. There needs to be a willingness on both sides to have a negotiated peace, which recognises both peoples rights to statehood and existence.

A colonial state?

Are the Jews in Israel white European colonialists who stole land from the Palestinians?





Colonialism - the policy or practice of acquiring full or partial political control over another country, occupying it with settlers, and exploiting it economically.

Jews are indigenous to Israel, the birthplace of their unique identity and culture. They have maintained a documented presence there for over 3000 years. Jews don't just come from Europe they come from all over the world.

Jews have lived across the Middle East, Africa, Asia and many other places before they returned to their ancestral homeland in Israel. Jews who came from Europe were not colonialists as they did not represent a foreign power. They were descendants of a long line of connection to the land of Israel. Archaeology, science and history all support the fact that Jews are indigenous to Israel, highlighted by the San Remo Conference in 1920 which officially recognised this. Jews have maintained their connection to Israel through religious practice, in their words said during prayer and the direction faced towards Jerusalem. Jewish presence in the land of Israel continued to exist and thrive after the Second Temple destruction in 70 CE. Jews did not settle, they returned home.





Why no ceasefire?



Shouldn't Israel have a truce with Hamas not only for the sake of the hostages but for innocent people dying in Gaza?

There was a truce between Israel and Hamas on October 6th. Hamas started this war on October 7th by slaughtering and kidnapping innocent Israelis. In an act of self-defence, Israel was forced to go to war with Hamas to protect not only its people but for its very existence. Israel is doing everything it can to avoid civilian deaths, whilst Hamas does what it can to maximise them. There is no doubt that Israel has a responsibility to bring the hostages back home, but the enemy is ruthless in its willingness to put civilians in danger.



Israel has been involved in negotiations with Hamas in order to make that a reality. Hamas have made it very clear they will not make a deal unless there is a permanent truce in Gaza and a complete withdrawal of Israeli troops. Israel cannot leave Hamas in power and cannot leave Hamas in control of the Gaza Strip. Hamas have said on several occasions that October 7th was just a rehearsal and they will do it over and over again until Israel is completely destroyed. Therefore Israel has to commit to its duty to the hostages whilst also ensuring the safety and security of its entire population.

<u>Democracy in a Jewish state</u>

Isn't a Jewish state racist and undemocratic?





Jewish people who are both secular and religious are people who have the right to self-determination. There is nothing racist about Jews being granted the right like other peoples to be self-governing and to have a state of their own. The Jewish people established a democratic government for their state it was granted by the UN in 1948 the UN admitted Israel as a member in 1949. Israel is the only democracy in the Middle East. The country is diverse and progressive it gives all their citizens equal rights. Women and LGBTQ people are

legally protected from discrimination in Israel, unlike other countries in the region. Significantly, 20% of Israel's population is made up of Arab citizens. Arab-Israelis have equal rights in Israel and are part of the democracy by being a part of the Knesset. Arab-Israelis have the right to vote just like Jewish Israelis. In the previous coalition there was an Arab party that was a part of the governing body. The Jewish people have been persecuted throughout history and need a state of their own. It is also their right to have self-determination. Despite this, Israel treats all its citizens equally whatever the religion or ethnicity.
